This year, in keeping with the Bicentennial celebration, the Philadelphia Psychiatric Society is presenting a number of special programs relating to Benjamin Rush, one of the founders of the American Psychiatric Association. As a part of this series, Drs. Heller, Lonsdorf and Sadoff helped to organize a program in October, highlighting the role that psychiatry has played in the rehabilitation of prisoners.

Other meetings of interest to members of the academy include the following:

1. The annual meeting of the Institute on Law, Psychiatry and the Mentally Disordered Offender, in Southern Illinois.
